Curriculum progression

PREVIOUSLY... Children may have taken part in a celebration of Diwali through play in the EYFS and whole school assemblies. However, it is the first proper introduction to Hinduism and what it is like to be a Hindu.

By the end of this unit, pupils are expected to be able to:

- Understand that Hindus believe in one God but that he can be represented in different ways.
- Say what the Trimurti represents.
- Discuss some important symbols like the Aum and what they represent.
- Discuss the celebration of Diwali and its importance for people.
